Passionate physicians and life-saving heart care for patients like Bruno Lanman inspire three families to invest in The Christ Hospital, and ensure the region's continued access to innovative programs, treatments, and research.

"The Christ Hospital gave me my life back."

Bruno Lanman had end-stage heart failure and needed a heart transplant. The wait was long, and during that time, life on the farm with his wife, Beth, and horse, Toby, suffered greatly.

"I couldn't walk out to the pasture without losing my breath, or do any of the things I love," says Bruno.

To improve Bruno's quality of life, Dr. Eugene Chung recommended he receive a left ventricular assist device (LVAD), a mechanical pump that

supports heart function and blood flow. Bruno underwent the surgery, and was soon back on his feet, feeling better than ever.

"After I received the LVAD, I could walk for miles. I could even ride my horse, which I never expected," says Bruno. "I am so grateful for the care I received, and for the generous donors who make this kind of care possible. The Christ Hospital gave me my life back."



Patient Lung Navigator

Provides Confidence and Comfort

A grant from The John A. Schroth Family Charitable Trust, PNC Bank, Trustee, has enabled the hospital to hire a Patient Lung Navigator for its Lung Screening and Nodule Program. The Navigator identifies patients at risk for lung cancer, as well as provides guidance and support through screening, planning, and treatment.

Gerry Priest sat with his wife in his physician's office as the diagnosis was delivered: Lung cancer. While still processing the news, Gerry struggled to keep up as treatment options were explained.

"I had so many questions about the disease, about surgery, about recovery. I was overwhelmed." He didn't know it at the time, but the person who entered the room next would change that. Tina DeStefanis-Griffiths, Gerry's Patient Lung Navigator, would be at his side over the coming months offering answers, guidance, and friendship.

"Tina spent a lot of time with us that afternoon. She explained everything and answered the questions my wife and I had, as well as those we didn't even know to ask yet," says Gerry. Tina and Gerry exchanged phone numbers and were in constant contact throughout his care.

"When I had to have surgery, I went into it understanding what was going to happen. I felt confident and hopeful, rather than confused and worried," says Gerry. Tina visited his hospital room every day, and was an active participant in meetings with his oncologists and other cancer care specialists. "Tina was keeping track of me after surgery, even when I wasn't asking her for anything."

"I treat people as though they're my family. I want to do everything possible for them. That's my role,"

explains Tina. An oncology nurse for 27 years, Tina took the role of Patient Lung Navigator at the hospital last year. The position was made possible through a grant from **The John A. Schroth Family Charitable Trust, PNC Bank, Trustee.** Its impact has been immense for Gerry, and for the many patients and families who have counted on Tina's expertise and compassion.

"That kind of attention is rare today, and made a huge difference for me," says Gerry.

Healthy Babies, Happy Moms

Proceeds from The Christ Hospital Gala 2016 are making an impact on Women's Health Programs, helping mothers like Jennifer Stankorb continue breastfeeding and safe sleep routines at home.

Just two weeks before she was to begin her dental assistant's training, Jennifer Stankorb gave birth to her daughter, Remi Paige, at The Christ Hospital. She wanted to breastfeed Remi, and needed a breast pump to support her breastmilk supply while she was away. Unfortunately, her insurance did not cover the cost of a pump.

"I was about to start school and money was tight. When I found out my insurance wouldn't cover the cost, my hormones took over, and I started crying," says Jennifer.

Nursing Careers

A \$200,000 grant from Charles E. Schell Foundation, Fifth Third Bank, Trustee provides financial support to students at The Christ College of Nursing & Health Sciences, enabling them to pursue their dreams of becoming nurses.

At 18-years-old and in her first year of nursing school, Carly Havens made an appointment with administrators at The Christ College of Nursing & Health Sciences to let them know she would be unable to continue taking classes. She felt her dream of a nursing career slipping away because she could not afford to pay for her education.

What would have been a horrible day for Carly took a dramatic turn for the better when college financial aid officers helped her apply for and secure a no-interest loan funded by a grant from **The Charles E. Schell Foundation**, **Fifth Third Bank**, **Trustee**.

"I went in thinking I was going to drop out of classes," says Carly. Instead, she received the financial assistance she needed, and encouragement. "Getting the loan made me feel that someone else believed in me," she says.

Few things can derail a student's dreams as quickly and devastatingly as a lack of funds. The cost of nursing education can be daunting. Carly's story is not unique, according to college President Gary Pack, Ed.D., who says that "without financial assistance many of the very best students would not be able to finish their programs."

Carly started her second year of nursing school in the fall, one year closer to earning her BSN, and following in the footsteps of her mother and grandmother, who are both nurses. Right now, she is interested in geriatric nursing. Carly knows that she has much more to learn, and many opportunities ahead in classwork and clinical placements. She is free to pursue those opportunities, thanks to financial support that kept her from delaying, and potentially abandoning, her education.
